Timothy C. Hawk, FAIA

As a nationally recognized mentor and innovative practitioner, Timothy Hawk, FAIA advances design and increases knowledge exchange among architects, allied professionals, and students through collaborative models, educational programming, and practice strategies.

BACKGROUND

Timothy C. Hawk, FAIA is an AIA leader, an innovative firm leader, and an educator. His passion for teaching and mentoring, focused on expanding access to the profession, is the guiding principle for his entire professional life. Hawk transformed his firm through mentorship of emerging architects and designers and the development of WSA leadership training programs. He is an impactful educator who works at the Community College level with diverse populations to daylight career potential, and he is a champion of collaborative programming which increases opportunities for mentorship.

ESTABLISHED NATIONAL MODELS FOR COLLABORATION & MENTORSHIP AIAS National Board of Directors

Hawk serves as the national AIA liaison to the American Institute of Architecture Students. Through his service to the student organization, he strengthens bonds and collaboration between the AIA and the AIAS.

- Restructured the relationship between AIA and AIAS staff to strengthen the communication, increase resource sharing, and amplify the student voice within the AIA.
- Represents the student voice and advocated for consideration of the student perspective as a member of the AIA national Strategic Council and the AIA national Board of Directors.
- Mentored student leaders and helped to coordinate an AIAS national advocacy day on Capitol Hill in Washington DC during the 2019 AIAS Grassroots. Students lobbied congress to approve a bill which would allow employers to contribute to 401k plans, matching employee payments which pay down student debt. The lobby day included over 400 students and transitioned the emphasis of the AIAS to include a robust interest in advocacy initiatives, both locally and nationally.

Columbus Center for Architecture & Design

During the Great Recession, AIA Columbus leadership increased community and civic engagement, and recognized the potential for a public forum highlighting design. Hawk led the development of a strategic planning which solidified support to establish the Columbus Center for Architecture & Design as a physical presence and a vehicle for interdisciplinary design mentorship. As the chapter president, Hawk led the initiative to conceive, implement and structure the Center, which opened on January 1, 2010. The Center offers a robust collection of outreach programs to build awareness of the power of design in communities. The premier

event, Camp Architecture, introduces design to diverse populations and received a grant from the American Architecture Foundation in 2011. Recent programming diversifies audiences to include emerging professionals and allied professionals in exhibits, educational programs, and presentations.

- The CFAD is a force for mentorship within the central Ohio design community. Since its inception, hundreds of youth have been the benefactors of mentorship and an early introduction to the profession.
- Programs provide opportunities for allied professionals to influence design dialogue, reinforcing the role of the CFAD as an incubator of mentorship.

Blueprint for Better, a national AIA program

As a member of the AIA's national Strategic Council representing the Ohio Valley, Hawk cochaired a working group focused on the role architects can play leading design dialogue within their communities. He established unprecedented protocols for local programs to be elevated to a national audience. The Blueprint for Better campaign was initiated in 2017 when Hawk partnered with the 2018 Institute president Carl Elefante, FAIA to coordinate programs in seven components, including AIA Columbus. Thereafter, the Institute funded over fifteen grants in 2018 and since to underwrite programs in cities across America.

- Hawk mentored component leaders in San Diego, Denver, San Antonio, Miami, Indianapolis, Omaha and Columbus. These leaders coordinated efforts to hold an event in their city to highlight urban planning and design challenges and influence policymakers, investors, and developers.
- In 2018, Hawk helped facilitate a national summit of leaders for training on the Blueprint for Better roll out.
- Hawk moderated a panel discussion at AIA National Conference on Architecture in Las Vegas in 2019. The discussion featured project videos and leaders from Baltimore and Indianapolis.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMMING

Columbus State Community College

Hawk serves the CSCC community as an adjunct professor of architecture. His on-going, twenty-year affiliation with the program helps non-traditional students gain access to careers in architecture. Beyond teaching and working directly with students on design, professional practice, and the history of architecture, Hawk is a mentor to countless students outside of the classroom.

- Hawk strengthened the relationship between the CSCC Department of Construction Science and the OSU Knowlton School of Architecture.
- Provides one-on-one mentorship to students who have pursued higher education at the KSA, MIT, Rice, Miami, and Yale, often as the result of direct mentorship.
- Recently, Hawk facilitated talks to articulate an agreement between CSCC and the KSA for class credit transfer. This aims to increase the diversity of students in the profession of architecture.

OSU Knowlton School of Architecture Alumni Society

As president of the OSU Knowlton School of Architecture Alumni Society, Hawk inherited a dormant Society and transformed the organization from a social group into a thriving alumni organization, connecting Architecture, Landscape Architecture, and City & Regional Planning

graduates from across America. The reinvigorated Alumni Society includes networking, mentorship, and knowledge sharing.

- Developed a spring semester resume and portfolio review session which provides an opportunity for students to gain access to direct one-on-one mentorship from alumni.
- Created a career fair forum where students gain access to personal stories on how alumni overcame challenges in their career path.
- Since the completion of his term, Hawk continues to present to the KSA AIAS Chapter on a wide range of topics. Typical attendance is between thirty and fifty students.

To build and enrich future leaders, Hawk organizes, leads, and coordinates a series of leadership development programs. Participants are introduced to skills and information necessary to lead WSA or any architectural firm. Several participants have become firm leaders. Others, through this mentorship, gain the self-awareness to pursue targeted career goals elsewhere.


