



To the Review Committee of the AIA Ohio Emerging Professional Award;

I have known Zachary Forney since 2018, when we worked together for the Better Block Foundation. I have witnessed his creativity with design and collaboration with community members from all walks of life. Since we first met, I have found him to be an absolute joy to work with and know.

When we were working at Better Block Foundation, I had the gift of witnessing the assets that Zachary brought to the community. Our collaboration began at the Exchange House which was a cultural hub and international hostel in the North Hill neighborhood of Akron, one of the most racially diverse and economically mixed neighborhoods in the country. He designed and helped to implement the construction of a pocket park behind the house. What started as a gravel parking lot transformed into a public space for neighbors to enjoy. It included a stage, seating area, market stalls, and greenery that was a throughway from the neighborhood street to the business district. Zachary laser cut a mini prototype of the market stalls and had it in the house for kids to play with and explore architecture. He also took time to understand the community's needs and cultural heritage. For example, he built a chautara, which is a Bhutanese-Nepali inspired round structure, that serves as a gathering place for pursuing love and having tough conversations.

After Zachary left his position and started working for AE Prime, I can attest to his continued work in the North Hill community. The City of Akron is investing in rebuilding some community centers in underserved areas, including Patterson Park Community Center in North Hill. When they began the design process, Zachary was a fierce advocate for collecting community feedback in order to inform the decisions being made about the new building. He helped to facilitate a listening session on Zoom with the City to hear aspirations from neighbors about what they wanted to see in the new building. This was an important part of the process that will reflect the community, elevate space, and cultivate activity.

As a creative community builder with deep roots in organizing collectively and cultivating place, I endorse Zachary Forney for the AIA Ohio Emerging Professional Award because of his commitment to the care of community through design and architecture.
